

Registering your phone number with the national registry will not eliminate these calls, but it will significantly reduce the number of telemarketing calls you receive. Say "Do Not Call" to unwanted telemarketing

How would you like to cut down on the number of unwanted phone calls you receive each week from telemarketers? Now you can, thanks to the Federal Trade Commission's National Do-Not-Call Registry.

It's easy. Call 888-382-1222, or go online at www.donotcall.gov and register your phone number. The service is free. Beginning in September 2003, telemarketers will be required to access the registry's database and remove from their call lists all numbers placed on the do-not-call registry.

Note: Some companies may still be allowed to call you, including charities, long distance companies, airlines, insurance companies operating under state regulations, and companies which you have a business relationship with.




New Board members look forward to the challenge



Neighbors help neighbors to prevent flood damage

We've seen our share of flooding in the past, but the heavy rains in May pushed waters to record levels. This caused trouble for a piece of NHTC's equipment. She was instrumental in coordinating with Rainsville police and DeKalb County EMA Director Ricky Little, who supplied us with sand bags. Sand was donated by Billy McDonald. The hard work paid off, as we were able to prevent serious damage to our equipment. This is a prime example of neighbors helping neighbors.

Lower ISO rating means better fire protection for New Hope

Hard work and dedication to community service have made New Hope a safer — and less expensive — place to live.

The ISO (Insurance Service Organization) rating for New Hope Volunteer Fire Department has been reduced to a four, a substantial drop from the previous rating of seven. This rating has an impact on homeowners insurance premiums.

"Depending on the type of home, I've been seeing decreases of \$30 to \$40 per year in premiums," says Alfa agent Jim Kennamer. "To qualify, they must live within five miles of the fire station, and within 1,000 feet of a standard hydrant."

Homeowners will not see the decreases, Kennamer added, until their policies renew.

While lower insurance rates are a positive benefit of the ISO rating reduction, citizens should be most excited about the work required to achieve the rating. After years of planning, the area protected by New Hope Volunteer Fire Department is a much safer place.

"This has been a joint effort between volunteers, the City of New Hope, and Madison County to provide fire protection and suppression for people who live, work or travel through our coverage area," says Ronald Schrimsher, the department's chief. A career fire fighter who works for Redstone Arsenal, Schrimsher



leads a group of volunteers dedicated to serving their neighbors.

"We started making efforts eight years ago to lower our ISO rating," says Schrimsher. "We knew that in order to lower the rating, we had to do business in a different manner."

The process began by doubling hose sizes to five-inch supply lines. The department also purchased new fire trucks and equipment, and built a new station on Russell Drive off Hobbs Island Road.

Prefire plans were developed for every commercial building in the department's 70-square-mile coverage area. These exhaustive documents fill two large three-ring binders, and feature such information as building dimensions, contact numbers, utility shut off locations, hazardous materials on site, and fire response concerns. Each truck carries its own copy of the binders.

An ISO inspection looks at department records covering the past three years, Schrimsher said. Because National Fire Protection Association standards change frequently, requirements for ISO ratings are constantly changing.

New Hope's water department played an important role in achieving the lower rating. As the city water began a system upgrade, Schrimsher worked closely with them to ensure the upgrades would meet ISO standards.

"We appreciate the fire department for all their hard work in helping get

the lines upgraded," says David Pritchett, the New Hope City Councilman who oversees the water department. "These dedicated volunteers worked on their own time to help Donald Clark and the water department crew with the upgrade."

In addition to fire protection, the New Hope VFD responds to medical emergencies and traffic accidents. Their equipment includes two "Jaws of Life" sets and numerous other extrication tools. Six volunteers are certified as EMTs.

The fire department will also be selling chicken and ribs at the New Hope Founders' Day Festival. Proceeds will help volunteers pay down their debt of \$262,000 associated with upgrading fire equipment.



R. A. Carpenter gave much to students, community of New Hope

R o b e r t Allen Carpenter, affectionately known

as "Pig," was born on Christmas Eve, 1910. What a great Christmas present to the people of New Hope. He graduated from Alabama in 1934 with a

Doctor of Law degree and returned to New Hope to start his career in the legal profession. He worked as a lawyer until some years later when the call came from the coaching and teaching profession. He answered the call and spent the next 20 years coaching and teaching at New Hope.

> Coach Carpenter was for many years the only coach at New Hope School. He coached the Jr. High, Jr. Varsity and Varsity basketball teams as well as the baseball team. He is best known in the coaching circles for his basketball teams, but he was also instrumental in starting the football program at New Hope.

> During his tenure as the basketball coach, Coach Carpenter's teams never had a losing season. They won 13 county championships and played in the finals the other 7 years.

Coach Carpenter received many awards during his 27 years of teaching and coaching, but his ultimate award was the everlasting love and respect of his former players.

The Physical Education Building at New Hope High School is named in honor of Coach Carpenter.

In addition to his coaching and teaching, Coach Carpenter served nine years as the Mayor of New Hope. During his time as only the second mayor of New Hope, he secured funds that enabled the town to have the first rural YMCA facility in the nation. His support enabled the Huntsville Metro YMCA to construct a gym and other facilities on a 17-acre complex in New Hope.

Coach Carpenter had been married to his wife, Bertie, for 42 years when he passed away in 1975. Mrs. Bertie Carpenter still resides in New Hope.

DAR's FFA String Band wins state honors

School. David Gamble decided that had been long enough.




