## Accounting Department stays on top of the numbers

Think about how much time you spend on basic household bookkeeping like paying your bills and balancing your checkbook. Add to that computing taxes and monitoring investments, and you have a few hours tied up each month in keeping the families finances in order.

Now imagine doing that for a multimillion dollar utility. That's what Bobby Morrison and Shelly Weaver do every day. Morrison is the Accountant and Weaver is the Accounts Payable Coordinator for New Hope Telephone Cooperative.

"Basically, anything that is bought or sold comes through this department," says Morrison. For example, when NHTC extends phone and cable service to a new residence, the Accounting Department tracks the costs associated with performing that project.

"All costs go into work orders," explains Morrison. "When the job is complete, we close out the work order and make sure everything gets expensed to the right category."

The department handles all financial matters that pertain to NHTC employees. "We're responsible for payroll, health insurance, W-2's and employee's 401(k)," Weaver says. "We also take care of the retiree insurance."

One of the few sure things in life is taxes, and it is Weaver's job to see that the government gets its share. "I prepare all the federal excise tax payments, state taxes and payroll taxes," she says.

Morrison has the responsibility of keeping the cooperative's Board of Directors informed regarding NHTC's financial condition. "I close out the month and print reports for the Board," he says. "I keep the expenses and revenue consistent, and show the net profit for the month."

Additionally, Morrison supplies the Board with payroll history and information on the performance of investments the cooperative has made.

As with many other roles at NHTC, Morrison and Weaver must work closely with other departments throughout the company. From customer service representatives to billing agents, the Accounting Department is involved in every facet of NHTC's operation.

Weaver holds an Associates degree from Snead State Community College. Morrison holds a four-year degree in accounting from Athens State University.



## Communicator earns national award

### NHTC receives national recognition for its member magazine

The spotlight shown on New Hope Telephone Cooperative's member magazine in February as the publication received national recognition.

The Communicator, published by NHTC for its members, was named the Best Subscriber Communications Program for 2006 by the National Telecommunications Cooperative Association (NTCA) at the organization's annual meeting and expo. NHTC Board President Jeff Cooper was on hand to accept the award.

"This is an amazing honor for New Hope Telephone," says Cooper. "For our small cooperative to receive this national award is very exciting."

New Hope Telephone's award was one of only six presented at NTCA's annual banquet. Cooper took the stage before thousands of board members, managers and other telecommunications professionals to accept the award. Michael Brunner, NTCA's CEO, presented the impressive plaque to Cooper.

According to the official awards program brochure, "The Best Subscriber Communications Program recognizes a telecommunications company's outstanding achievement in subscriber relations through the development of a well-rounded subscriber information program."

#### Why the Communicator

New Hope Telephone Cooperative began working on the concept for *The Communicator* in the fall of 2001. Members received the first issue in January of 2002. The goals of the early issues were to:



- 1. Provide members with information about the cooperative, its services and special promotions;
- 2. Spotlight interesting people in the service area through human interest stories; and
- 3. Provide a means of sharing news, events and announcements within the communities served by NHTC.

The Communicator has grown con-

siderably in recent years. The publication has evolved to include more community information. It features more pages, and is published on a monthly basis.

A major change came in early 2005 when the Board decided to offer area businesses the opportunity to advertise in the magazine. Before launching this program, NHTC carefully developed an advertising policy to provide clear guidelines for all advertising decisions and to ensure a fair and consistent advertising program.

"We get calls and hear comments all the time about *The Communicator*," says Cooper. "Our communities aren't served by a local newspaper, so *The Communicator* gives the people a way to stay informed, and they love it."

Not only do NHTC members have a way to share and receive community information, *The Communicator* also provides businesses with a tool to increase their exposure and enhance sales.

Of course, the cornerstone of the magazine is still the direct line of communication it provides between New Hope Telephone and its members. "Our magazine is the primary way we keep our members informed about new services, system upgrades, special promotions and other cooperative news," says Cooper.

"We are excited about this national award," he adds. "But even without that, we're excited about providing a magazine that our members enjoy and that keeps our communities connected.

That's what being a cooperative is really all about."


New Hope Telephone Cooperative will pick up the entries from each school. An independent panel chosen by NHTC will judge for 1st place in three divisions for each school.

## Real life angels among us

### Angel Food program feeds body and soul in New Hope area

Food nourishes a person's physical nature. Through the Angel Food Ministries, New Hope United Methodist Church is also nourishing the spiritual nature.

For the past year, volunteers have helped the church pick up, package and distribute hundreds of boxes of food through the Angel Food program. Church members say the food has not only helped them feed the community, it has helped them reach out to hurting people from all walks of life.

"Our goal is not to sell food," says church pastor Michael Carpenter. "It's to meet the people in the community."

The Angel Food program is a monthly distribution of food that provides participants with \$50 worth or more of food for only \$25. Although anyone can purchase a unit of food, the program is particularly helpful to those on a fixed income or facing an emer-

gency situation in their life. In addition to low-cost food, participants are exposed to the love of God through the members of New Hope United Methodist Church.

"We've met people who have never been exposed to the church before," says Carpenter. "They ask us to pray for their families, and discuss their problems with us. Relationships are being made."

In addition to prayer and counseling, people in the community have also learned about the church's food pantry through Angel Food. "It's been one of the greatest ministries we've entered into," Carpenter says. "It has spawned other ministry opportunities, exposing the church to people who need other help."

#### A tearful beginning

The story of how New Hope United Methodist Church became involved in

Angel Food is a sad one. It begins at the H.E.A.L.S. Clinic in New Hope, where Ellen Rozell is the administrator.

"A mother with two young children stopped by my office telling me she had food stamp money for an Angel Food Ministries order, but she didn't have the gas to get to Huntsville," recalls Rozell.

Rozell knew the woman well, and had built a relationship with her over time as she assisted

## What is Angel Food?

Angel Food Ministries is a national organization that helps people enjoy quality food for less money. For \$25, participants receive a large box filled with name brand foods in perfect condition (no dented cans or out-of-date packages).

One \$25 unit of meat, fresh and frozen vegetables, eggs and dairy products has a retail value of \$50 to \$65, allowing people to double the buying power of their food budget. There are no eligibility requirement; anyone can purchase food through the program regardless of their income level.

the young mother with referrals for help with groceries and utility bills. Rozell reached in her purse and handed the woman \$5 to purchase gas for her car.

A few days later came the awful news. The young woman had died suddenly and unexpectedly on New Year's Day, leaving behind a son and daughter. Rozell thought of the family, and she thought of the food order the woman had placed.

"I called and spoke with Manna House, the food distribution center in Huntsville," she says, "and they said I could come pick up the food to deliver to the family."

Rozell says she was amazed when she picked up the order. "It was a real ministry," she recalls. "I was shocked. I told them I was picking up food for the woman who had passed away...they prayed for me, and they prayed for her family."

Rozell came back excited and inspired. She spoke with her pastor, Michael Carpenter, about Angel Food Ministries, and the church researched the program.

New Hope United Methodist Church decided to try Angel Food, and the first month placed 30 orders. That number has grown considerably, with one month reaching 174 orders.

An Angel Food truck will come to the church when orders reach 250 per month. Until then, members must travel to Huntsville early on distribution day to off-load food from tractor trailer rigs onto their personal vehicles and bring the food back to New Hope for packaging into individual units. For those volunteers, the morning starts around 4 a.m. Some people donate money to purchase extra boxes each month. Carpenter loads these into his truck and heads out into the community. "I rotate the direction each month," he says. "North, East, South or West. I find a side road and follow God's lead."

In a recent month, Carpenter was driving along when he received clear direction. "I had already passed the drive way," Carpenter relates, "when God said 'you need to go back.' So I did, and the woman was so grateful. She had tears in her eyes."

Angel Food has not only been a blessing to the community, but to the church as well. "Our volunteers are just as on fire as they were in the beginning," says Jean Mann, the church secretary who coordinates the program. "We would like to help a lot more people in the community."





### NHTC employees get 'Street Smart'

As part of New Hope Telephone Cooperative's commitment to safety and training, several employees recently participated in a Street Smart seminar.

Most training revolves around staying safe on the job. While this seminar certainly provided such information, it offered employees much more. The main focus was on the personal safety of each employee and his or

her family. Participants learned several invaluable tips and tools for staying safe at home, in the car and while in public places, such as the mall.

During the one-hour seminar, participants received practical, applicable advice to help reduce their risk of

Crime in rural communities such as ours is increasing at a rate four times faster than the national average. Protect yourself with this practical advice:

- **Be alert**. Always be aware of your surroundings.
- **Don't fight.** If someone tries to take your wallet or purse, give it to them. You increase the risk of being hurt or killed by resisting.
- Don't open your car door to a stranger. If your car breaks down and someone stops to help, crack your window and tell them another person called the police about 15 minutes earlier and ask them to please call again. If the person is a Good Samaritan, he will make a call and help will be on the way. If the person is a criminal you've just let them know the police are on the way.

Our Maker has given us general instructions for a good, long life. The words of God; "they are life unto those that find them, and health to all their flesh."










## New Hope Historical Association Museum opening

#### **Broccoli Salad**

I cup slivered almonds
I cup salted sunflower seeds
I/2 cup sugar
I/4 cup apple cider vinegar
I cup vegetable oil
I pkg Chicken Mushroom Ramen
Noodles

Cook noodles without seasoning, drain and mix with onion and slaw mix. In another bowl mix sugar, apple cider, vegetable oil and seasoning mix from noodles. Let set at least 2 minutes, then pour over slaw and noodle mixture. Add nuts just before serving.

#### **Chicken Salad**

3-13oz. cans chicken breast Grapes to taste Salt & Pepper to taste 6 Boiled eggs Pecan Pieces to taste Mayonnaise

Use a fork and break up chicken. Then mix all other ingredients into chicken with mayonnaise to the consistency you prefer.

## Hot Dog Bacon Wrap

2 pkgs of hot dogs cut length wise making 3 pieces

I lb bacon cut length wise making 3 pieces

I box brown sugar

I box wooden tooth picks

Take each piece of hot dog and wrap a piece of bacon around it holding it on with wooden tooth picks. Place wrapped hot dogs into crock pot and pour in box of brown sugar. Cook on high until bacon is done. Bacon will never get brown. Take out and eat.

#### **Hominy Casserole**

I stick margarine
I large jar Cheez Whiz® Salsa
Con Queso (or any other brand
of Con Queso)
I can mushroom soup
3 small cans hominy (drained)
Corn chips (crushed)

Melt margarine in microwave. Add Cheez Whiz and soup and heat thoroughly. Mix in hominy. Add corn chips on top when ready to serve. Bake in 350° oven for 15 minutes.

## Sour Cream Coconut Cake

1-18 oz. butter flavored cake mix 2 cups sugar

Prepare cake mix as directed on box (make 2 layers). When cool, split each layer. Combine sugar, sour cream and coconut. Reserve I cup of mixer frosting. Spread the rest between layers. Combine reserved sour cream mixture with topping. Frost top and sides. Store in airtight container in refrigerator. Better if prepared 2 to 3 days before eating.


