Meet the NHTC Team - Part 1

Making a phone call or logging onto the Internet seems like a simple task to the consumer. But behind those actions are millions of dollars worth of equipment and a staff working hard to make sure that equipment performs properly for our cooperative members.

This is the job of the Central Office. The Central Office team maintains a tremendous amount of equipment at our headquarters in New Hope. We are responsible for all the gear that connects you with the outside world.

Our role does not stop there, however. Our responsibility extends to the field through our network of fiber rings and our remote cabinets. These are the units you see on the roadsides that supply dial tone and DSL throughout the NHTC system.

I started work for NHTC in January of 1995, and became Central Office Manager in the year 2000. Other members of the Central Office team include David Whitaker, Donald Morrison and Mark Beem.

The Central Office is involved in several projects that will ultimately allow us to provide improved service to our members. We are nearing completion of an upgrade project that will move high-speed circuits from copper to fiber for a large industrial customer. We are also in the process of evaluating and upgrading our battery backup system, which keeps our network working for you during a power outage.

Upgrading from OC3 to OC12 is a major project. See Page 5 for more information on these plans.

Technology moves quickly in the telecommunications industry. The switch (the equipment that handles all your calls) we installed 10 years ago is now old technology. We are currently evaluating what direction to take, and will install a new switch this year.

We are also moving several highspeed circuits between cabinets so we can replace older units without interrupting service to our members.

Working in the Central Office provides great challenge, and I enjoy working for our members a great deal.

In January, NHTC Board member Jeff DeArmond and General Manager Teresa Hunkapiller each received an Excellence in Leadership Award from the National Telecommunications Cooperative Association. The awards recognize successful completion of key NTCA seminar courses (such as Employment Law, Telco Revenue Streams, the Role of a Director and Surveying the Telco's Competitive Landscape). "These courses give us a deeper understanding of how a cooperative operates," says DeArmond. Such continuing education for NHTC's leadership is necessary, Hunkapiller says, "to help keep our cooperative strong into the future."

Implementing FTTH is a team project

Maria Goodson named Project Manager for NHTC Strategic Plan

As discussed recently in *The Communicator*, New Hope Telephone Cooperative is involved in a plan to deploy fiber technology throughout its service area. Known as Fiber-To-The-Home, or FTTH, this proactive approach will help ensure the company's long-term viability while changing the way members apply technology to their everday lives.

FTTH is a major part of NHTC's strategic plan, which was developed through the assistance of the National Telecommunications Cooperative Association. Maria Goodson, NHTC's Manager of Marketing, was recently named Project Manager for the plan.

The development of a project plan

will help ensure the success of the FTTH rollout. "It gives us a map showing where we need to be in three to five years," Goodson explains. "A project plan allows us to see the actions required to accomplish our goals."

Members of the project team working with Goodson on the FTTH rollout include: Teresa Hunkapiller, General Manager; Steven Campbell, Central Office Manager; Rusty Bright, Network Administrator; Robert Patterson, Plant Engineer; Tim Wright, Acting Outside Plant Supervisor; and Tammy Weeks, Office Manager.

The process began with lengthy meetings to identify the steps required to implement FTTH. These fall under five


areas of implementation: Technology, Financial, Marketing/Member & Public Relations, Business & Economic Development, and Human Resources.

"The first step was to identify all the tasks and develop a schedule for completing them," says Goodson. All tasks are assigned to a team member, with deadlines attached.

"The project management approach keeps people on track," Goodson adds, "helping us all stay on schedule to accomplish this enormous goal."

Goodson is excited to be working with her capable team members to bring FTTH to the area. "There is a lot of positive energy as we drive the company into the future," she says.

OC12 upgrade on the horizon

Equipment upgrade will mean more bandwidth for NHTC's network

New Hope Telephone Cooperative plans to upgrade its OC3 to an OC12 by the end of April.

While that terminology makes little sense to most members, the results should make everyone happy.

"We are upgrading our link to the world," explains Central Office Manager Steven Campbell. "When this upgrade is complete, we will have up to four times more bandwidth than we have now to carry our telephone and Internet traffic."

Part of the benefit will be the increased capacity for moving telephone calls and related traffic. The upgrade will allow NHTC to offer more high-speed circuits to area businesses, along with advanced features such as video conferencing.

The upgrade will also reduce the bottleneck in NHTC's connection to the Internet. "The capacity will be there," explains Network Administrator Rusty Bright. "We will have alerts to indicate

when we reach 80 percent capacity, and we can increase it by 10 meg or so."

With the capacity in place, Bright says the incremental increases in Internet bandwidth can be accomplished "with a work order and a phone call."

Dial-up and DSL customers should both see a difference in Internet performance. The upgrade will result in lower latency, a particularly important issue for "gamers" who play video games with people over the Internet.



'Walls of Jericho' is a natural marvel

Last fall, Bobby and June Cooper of New Hope decided they had heard enough about the Walls of Jericho, the latest acquisition of the state's Forever Wild Land Trust. The natural wonder sounded so amazing, they had to see it for themselves.

The Cooper's were joined by Bobby's cousin Billy Cooper and wife

Doris, also of New Hope. The four took to the trail leading to the Walls of Jericho around nine o'clock in the morning. It was almost 6 p.m. when they made it back to their vehicles.

According to outdooralabama.com, the trail takes hikers 2.5 miles downhill to Clarke Cemetery. From there, another half mile remains to reach the Walls of Jericho with its high rock walls and waterfalls.

"It looks like a cathedral washed out in the rock," says Bobby Cooper, "like a stage carved out of the wall."

The Walls of Jericho is part of a 21,453-acre tract purchased by The Nature Conservancy in 2004. More than 12,000 acres are in Alabama, with the remainder in Tennessee.

Besides the hiking trail, a separate 8.3-mile horse trail leads into the gorge.

In addition to the rugged beauty of the landscape, the area is home to an abundance of wildlife. This includes 100 species of fish, 45 species of mussel, and numerous salamanders and birds. A number of inhabitants are rare or endan-

> gered, including the pale lilliput and Alabama lampshell mussels which exist no where else in the world.

Visiting the Walls of Jericho

The hike into this marvel of nature is no stroll through the park. The steep ascent out of the gorge is strenuous. But if you are in reasonably good condition and take your time, you will enjoy the visit. Here are a few tips:

- Wear comfortable hiking footwear.
- A backpack will help you carry the recommended two to three liters of water, along with some light snacks to help fuel your adventure.
- Start early. If you hike at a moderate pace, and spend a couple of hours in the gorge, the round trip will take some six hours.
- The trail can stay muddy for days following a rain shower, and you will have to cross several shallow streams. You may get wet and muddy, so dress accordingly.
- Don't forget your camera!

Directions

Go North on Highway 72 from Huntsville. Take a left on Highway 79 to the Skyline/Hightop community. The Walls of Jericho Tract is just North of Hightop. Highway 79 goes through the tract. The first parking lot is for the horseback riding trail. The second parking lot is for the hiking trail.

It is time to sow seeds. Farmers and gardeners all over the county are once again sowing seeds in fields

and garden spots. Seeds are either thrown as far and wide as possible or they are neatly spaced in straight rows. Then comes the watering.

The methods and equipment used today have changed considerably, wouldn't you agree? The process however, has not changed since the beginning of time. The Bible says "cursed is the ground for thy sake; in sorrow shalt thy eat of it all the days of thy life;...Thorns also and thistles shall it bring forth to thee; and thou shalt eat the herb of the field." (Genesis 3:17-18) Anyone who has ever planted knows that the process of planting and watering is simple but requires a great deal of hard work. We also know that there is just so much that you can do. The rest of the process is a mystery.

The mysterious part is the impossible part. The dry seed germinates! The tiny roots go down into the moist soil. Tiny green shoots showing tentatively above the ground. A miracle takes place, which has no explanation apart from God. The life in the plant produces another wonder as its fragrance, color,

But the mysterious process of what the spiritual seed does in the human heart, that is left up to God! The Apostle Peter speaks of this mystery ... "Being born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the word of God which liveth and abideth forever. For all flesh is like grass, and all the glory of man like the flower of grass."

Writing letters is also a nonthreatening way to share! Parents can write letters to their children about their families, an incident they find serious or very funny, or about childhood memories. Those letters from parent to child also serve as a model for how to write letters. If a grandparent was deceased prior to the child's memory, letters about who the grandparents were, what they did, where they lived, or other important details can be included in letters as a way of preserving family history.

How did a lady from New Hope change her life?
