## Be sure to cast your ballot




As a member of New Hope Telephone Cooperative, you are encouraged to attend the annual meeting and participate in the democratic process of electing Board members.

Cooperative members are part owners in the company. As such, it is important that each member let his or her voice be heard. One of the most important ways to do that is to cast your ballot in the election for members of the Board of Directors. By voting on who represents the leadership of the company, you are helping shape the future of NHTC.

On Tuesday, May 19 there are two Board positions up for election. They are Place #2, New Hope (currently held by Jim Duncan) and Place #3, New Hope (currently held by Jeff Cooper).

Follow these simple steps to cast your ballot:

- 1) Attend NHTC's Annual Meeting on Tuesday, May 19 (Registration begins at 5:00 p.m.). A photo ID is required to register.
- 2) Present your admittance ticket and ID and register in the Elementary-Middle School Lunchroom.

## New Hope mayor reports on first six months in office

Born and raised in New Hope, Mayor John Lee Howard has spent his entire life living in the town that he loves.

A two-term city councilman, Howard became mayor of New Hope last October.

"I love this little city and I am proud to live here," Howard says. "I want everyone to be proud of it. I want to make New Hope a better place to live in every aspect. I believe that by working together with the council for the greater good of New Hope, we can accomplish just that."

Howard, 53, and his father owned Howard's General Merchandise for 20

years. In 1997, Howard's father retired from the family business. After being in business for more than 50 years, the family decided to close the store.

Howard went to work for the Department of Transportation (DOT) as an equipment operator in 1993. Because University of Alabama Huntsville (UAH) offers a significant tuition break

for children of employees, Howard took a job at UAH while his two children attended college there. From 1993 until 2007 Howard worked as a painter

and equipment operator for the DOT, Madison County and UAH.

Howard currently works in the trophy and award business. He has owned a trophy shop for almost 10 years, and has worked full-time with his business for the last three years.

Howard says he has many goals for the city of New Hope.

"A priority goal for my first term in office is to get a new senior citizen building for New Hope," Howard says. "I feel like it is a real need in this com-

> munity. Our seniors have taken care of us and of this city for all of our lives. It is time now for us to return that favor and show our appreciation by helping take care of them."

Other goals Howard has for the city include cracking down on crystal meth and other drugs, relinguishing other crimes, slowing down traffic, addressing flood issues and bringing new businesses and jobs to New Hope.

"I'm not a

member of any clique," Howard says. "I'm not tied to the goals and agendas of any certain group. I'm tied to the people of New Hope and I will work with the council to do what is best for all of our citizens. I'm just an honest individual who wants to preserve rights and laws for everyone and make New Hope a better place to live for all."

Howard says the city, like the rest of the nation, is facing some difficult times.

"We are at a difficult time in this nation," Howard says. "I am aware of that and we are doing everything that we can to tighten the belt without creating neglect. Cities of all sizes are struggling financially and New Hope is no different. That's why I am hoping to bring some new industry to New Hope, to create some new jobs and help jump-start our local economy. It all starts there and I believe we can do it."

Howard is also hoping to save city money by gaining a better grasp on flooding issues. He was able to set up a much-needed flood plain stage analysis with the Corps of Engineers at no cost, possibly saving the city hundreds or even thousands of dollars by arranging the work for free.

"This will benefit our city

tremendously. We need an accurate assessment of this situation so that we can get a handle on our flooding issues," Howard says. "This will provide the city with a blueprint of what we need to do to solve our drainage and flooding problems. Also, if we can more accurately report our city's problems based on a professional assessment, we would have a much better chance at getting state and federal grants for future projects."

Howard says he has enjoyed his first few months in office.


"I have really enjoyed being the Mayor of New Hope," Howard says. "Every day, I get to meet with people and talk to them and try to help them to the best of my ability. That is very fulfilling.

"We have to look forward in New Hope," Howard adds. "We can't accomplish all of these things in one term, but

we can do our best every day to make this a better place to live. I am fortunate to have a wonderful city council. We work as teammates to try to solve problems. We share the same vision for the future of this city."

Howard has two children. His son, John Thomas Howard, graduated from UAH then attended law school at Cumberland School of Law in Birmingham. He received his law degree and license to practice in 2007. John Thomas is currently a corporate attorney with Cabaniss Johnston in Birmingham. Mayor Howard's daughter, Jennifer Lee Howard, graduated from UAH and is working toward a master's in psychology and sociology.

He and his wife, Kay have been happily married for 30 years and work together at their trophy store, Howard's Trophy Shop.▲







Adrienne Booth graduated from New Hope High School in 1989. An A+ student, Booth took advantage of her education at NHHS, earning a full scholarship to the University of Alabama Huntsville (UAH) where she earned a bachelor's degree in Electrical Engineering.

Booth was also accepted to Dartmouth College, an Ivy League school in Hanover, N.H.

"Getting accepted to an Ivy League school was a very big deal at the time, both for me and for New Hope," Booth says. "It was quite an honor. They flew me up to see the campus. It was a great experience."

Because of the financial strain it would have put on her family, Booth chose to accept the full ride to UAH.

"I believe that everything happens for a reason and I am the person I am supposed to be, in the place I am supposed to be, but sometimes I wonder, 'what if?'," Booth reflects. "Regardless, it has worked out well. I could not be any happier with my life and I was able to get a great education on full scholarship at UAH."

During her senior year at UAH, only a semester away from graduation, Booth began to question her calling in life.

"I was at a crossroads in my life," Booth says. "I was beginning to have doubts about becoming an engineer. I just felt like I did not want that to be my legacy in life."

Athough Booth was fairly certain she did not want to be an engineer, she was unsure what other career she wanted to pursue.

"I had a very wise aunt," Booth says. "She asked me to pray for a sign; to pray that I would be satisfied with whatever I decided to do; to pray for peace with my decision."

During the time Booth was deciding what direction to take her life, she was approached by a deacon in her church who requested her to teach a youth Sunday School class.

"I took to teaching that Sunday School class like a fish to water," Booth says. "And that was my sign. I knew that this was divine intervention. I just felt the Lord saying, 'this is what I want you to do with your life.' I can remember sitting in my engineering classes after that working on things for my next Sunday School lesson. I have never had a second thought."

After graduation Booth immediately went back to school and earned a teaching certificate. She taught high school math for 11 years at Butler High School until the birth of her daughter, Samantha Booth. She is now a full time mother.

Booth reflects fondly upon her time at New Hope.

"I loved going to New Hope," Booth says. "Attending a smaller school gives you a real sense of pride and belonging. I loved the whole community."

Booth says her natural abilities and guidance from family were the reasons she excelled in school.

"School always came naturally to me," Booth says. "I never had to study much in high school and didn't really learn how until college. My family was also very influential in my education. Everybody did well. Everybody went to college. That was already in place for me. There wasn't a question whether or not I was going to go to college."

Booth says she believes education is not only a benefit for a student's future, but a necessity.

"People don't realize that there are places in this world where people don't get to go to school," Booth says. "Here you get to go to school for free! You have the right to a quality public education. That is something that is gold. Quitting school is like flushing money down the toilet."


Booth is equally emphatic about continuing education after high school.

"Nowadays, to succeed, it is almost a necessity to further your education after high school," Booth says. "I am a big proponent of post secondary education. That doesn't mean you have to go to college. You just have to get educated.

"If you don't want to get a Bachelors degree, go to a technical school to learn a trade or skill," she adds. "There are a lot of skilled labor jobs that should not be overlooked in this area - machinists, computeraided drafting, electricians, welders. But those jobs still take knowledge. It still takes education to make yourself marketable."

"That's how we're going to rebuild our country as a whole," she added enthusiastically. "A-B-C and Dick and Jane just won't cut it alone anymore. You need more from education. You need to always increase your knowledge. Get all that you can get. If you can get a bachelor's, why not get a master's? Why not go out and get a Ph.D.? If you can do it, then do it. Its that simple.

"You must always be vigilant," she adds. "You've got to always keep your game face on. You've got to always keep your edge. And that comes from getting an education. Learning is a journey not a destination. It is a lifelong destination. Knowledge is forever. Knowledge is eternal."



#### Legislative Update

It's mid-April as I work on this column. The General Fund Budget will be reviewed in the next few days in the House, while

the Education Fund Budget will be reviewed in the Senate.

As a member of the House Education Appropriations Committee, I have the responsibility and privilege to ensure that education dollars are spent wisely. I take that job very seriously and will be working diligently to make sure that our Education Fund Budget is in line with the important needs of our educators and schools.

I have also been working on two important local bills that will benefit our district.

HB 449 will prevent any company from building a rock quarry within two miles of an existing school in Madison County. HB 779 will give the Madison County License Director the authority to void licenses that are paid for with invalid personal checks. I am proud to report that both of these bills have passed the House and have been sent to the Senate.

There has been a lot of disagreement and filibustering in both houses lately. With only a few meeting days remaining in the session and a lot of legislation to consider, we will certainly have our work cut out for us.

#### Charity Bike Ride comes to New Hope

The Huntsville Both Parents program, a department of the Huntsville Family Services Center, has chosen New Hope as the location for its 3rd Annual Spring Fling Metric Century Bike Ride. The charity fundraiser will take place Saturday, May 9, 2009. The event will begin at 8:00 a.m. at New Hope United Methodist Church.

"This fundraiser is vital to the continued success of our program and we are excited to be returning to New Hope for the 3rd Annual Spring Fling Metric Century Bike Ride," says Carrie Wilson, Both Parents program executive. "We are extremely thankful to the city of New Hope and are hoping for a good turnout for our ride. We urge residents of this area to show their support and come out and join in on all the fun and festivities."

Cyclists can choose from a variety of routes based on what distance they would like to ride. There are routes that range from a short six mile route for beginners, to a 62 mile + route for the more experienced cyclists. Route distances are: 6 miles, 25 miles, 36 miles, 50 miles and 62 + miles.

There is also a Family Fun Ride that is six miles long and leaves at 10:00 a.m. All routes begin and end at New Hope United Methodist Church.

"This area of North Alabama is absolutely beautiful," Wilson says. "It is ideal for cycling enthusiasts and nature

lovers alike. From scenic rolling hills to gorgeous valleys, this bike ride has it all. Our route will tour around Madison, Marshall and Jackson counties and will include views of the Paint Rock River, Cathedral Caverns and much more."

There will be several well-stocked rest stops and volunteer support personnel along the way to provide assistance to cyclists as needed. There will also be an after-ride Dominoes Pizza lunch at New Hope United Methodist Church.

The cost is \$35 for individuals, \$25 per individual for teams and families of at least three participants and \$5 per individual for the the six-mile Fun Ride. You can also register by mailing a form that can be picked up at NHTC.

Both Parents is a non-profit program of the Huntsville Family Services Center. The program provides supervised visitation for parents who are court-ordered to have supervised visits with their children.

#### **SPLENDA ICE CREAM**

(Martha Cooper, Grant)

2 cups Splenda (2-1/2 cups if adding fruit) 2 cans fat-free sweetened condensed milk

I (8oz.) Lite Cool Whip I small pkg. sugar-free pudding, vanilla or chocolate flavored (optional) 2 Tbs. vanilla 1% milk

Combine all ingredients except milk, Pour into a I gallon ice cream maker. Finish filling with 1% milk. Freeze according to the directions on your ice cream maker.

#### **EASY BAR-B-QUE CHICKEN**

I cup ketchup

Mix coke and ketchup. Pour over chicken. chicken. Pork chops can also be substituted for chicken.

#### **PEANUT BUTTER PIE**

350° oven until cheese is melted.

(Martha Cooper, Grant) I cup peanut butter 8 oz. light cream cheese I lb. confectioner's sugar 16 oz. Lite Cool Whip 2 pie shells

Cream peanut butter and cream cheese until smooth. Mix in sugar a little at a time. Fold in Cool Whip. Pour into 2 baked pie shells or Graham cracker crusts. Garnish with Reeses peanut butter

I tsp. kosher salt fresh black pepper to taste

Preheat oven to 350°F. In a large pot, cook pasta until done. While pasta is cooking, in a separate pot, melt the butter. Whisk in the flour and mustard, keeping it moving for about five minutes, making sure it is free of lumps. Stir in milk, onion, bay leaf and paprika. Simmer for about 10 minutes then remove the bay leaf. Add the egg, mix thoroughly, and stir in 3/4 of the cheese. Season with salt and pepper. Fold the macaroni into the mix, Pour into a 2 quart casserole dish. Top with remaining cheese.

TOPPING: 3 Tbs. butter I cup bread crumbs

Melt butter in a small sauce pan then add the bread crumbs to coat. Sprinkle the bread crumb mixture on top of casserole. Bake for 30 minutes. Remove and let stand for 5 minutes before serving.

(Martha Cooper, Grant) I whole chicken, cut up or assorted chicken pieces 20 oz. coke

Cook in an electric skillet or any large skillet for I hour if using bone in chicken. Cook for 45 minutes if using boneless

#### **BEST BAKED MAC-N-CHEESE**

1/2 lb. large elbow macaroni

3 Tbs. butter

3 Tbs. flour

I Tbs. dry mustard

3 cups milk

I egg

1/2 cup finely diced onion

I bay leaf

1/2 tsp. paprika

12 oz. shredded sharp cheddar cheese (or more if you like it really cheesy)
