Local soliders injured in Iraq

Teresa Hunkapiller named NHTC's General Manager

Long-time New Hope Telephone Cooperative employee Teresa Hunkapiller has been named the company's new general manager.

The Board of Directors last month tapped Hunkapiller for the position

left vacant by the departure of Terry Blakemore. A resident of Tennessee, Blakemore had been hired to replace Tom Butler, but resigned in July for personal and family reasons.

Hunkapiller brings a vast knowledge of NHTC's business operations to her new role. She came to work for the cooperative in 1987 with a degree in business administration, with an emphasis in financial management. She served as accounting specialist and head of accounting before being promoted in 2001 to office manager.

During her time in that position, Hunkapiller played an important role in a number of important NHTC projects. These included consolidation

of capital credit files, voter identification and roster-method voting, management transition, modernization of NHTC's billing process, and the new credit card payment acceptance process.

"I appreciate the confidence placed in me by the Board of Directors," says Hunkapiller. "I am grateful for the opportunity to serve the people of Grant, New Hope and Owens Cross Roads in this capacity."

Hunkapiller is a native of the area, having been brought up in the Cedar Point/Butler's Mill community of New Hope. She is the daughter of



Alton and Lillie Maples, and the granddaughter of Lucille Maples.

Hunkapiller graduated in the top of her class at New Hope High School in 1982, where she was voted 'Most Likely To Succeed' by her fellow classmates. She went on to earn her degree from the University of Alabama in Huntsville. She is married to Joe Hunkapiller. The approach Hunkapiller plans to take toward managing NHTC is grounded in the principles of the cooperative form of business. "We are here to meet the needs of our members," she says, "and that mindset

should guide everything we do. Every decision we make should be based on the wellbeing of the cooperative as a whole."

Hunkapiller asks for the patience of members as she works through a number of issues as their new general manager. "I will be prioritizing efforts on many fronts," she says, "which will take some time. In the meantime, I want all our members to know that I am willing, and will make myself available, to listen to their suggestions or concerns."

In the best interest of all members of the cooperative, Hunkapiller says she is dedicated to education, training and self-development — for

herself and New Hope Telephone's employees.

"I want to thank everyone who has worked with me, encouraged me and believed in me," she says. "I will do my very best to lead this cooperative with honesty, integrity and fairness, always keeping the best interest of our membership at heart. I look forward to the challenges ahead."

CHIT HEAVE TO BE

Some 300 friends and fellow public servants gathered in Grant on August 15 to dedicate a monument to the memory of Verlon Lemaster, Jr. Exactly one year earlier, Lemaster, the town's Chief of Police, was fatally wounded in the line of duty. Through the generosity of local citizens, and from people as far away as Washington state, the memorial was funded totally by donations. The monument features Lemaster's name, his dates of birth and death, and the poem Policeman's Prayer. An eternal flame burns continuously in front of the monument. "It will be there for generations to come as a daily reminder of him," says Robert Patterson, Grant's Fire Chief and a close friend of Lemaster, and an employee of NHTC. "It's also a reminder of the danger we all face any day our name could be chiseled in stone."

Sun spots can interfere with cable TV reception

The atmospheric disturbance known as 'sun spots' often causes interference with satellites, many of which are used to transmit cable channels. The result: your TV cable channels become snowy.

This natural phenomenon is expected to occur the first ten days of October. It causes cable channels to be snowy for 10 or 15 minutes each midafternoon (only cable channels are affected; local channels 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11 should remain clear).

Absolutely nothing can be done to prevent this brief interference. It is a natural occurrence beyond the control of New Hope Telephone.

RECIPES

Nana's Southern Salsa

1 can black-eyed peas (unseasoned)
1 can shoe peg corn or whole kernel corn

1 can black beans

Drain and rinse all and pour into large bowl.

Add:

2 cans Rotel (or diced tomatoes & green chilies)
2 cans diced tomatoes (I used roasted garlic)
1 purple onion, diced
1/2 bunch cilantro, chopped
juice of 1/2 lime

Optional:

sliced green onions chopped jalapenos minced or chopped garlic salt pepper

Pour in one small bottle zesty italian dressing, cover and refrigerate overnight. Drain well before serving (it does take a while to drain). You may want to cut tomatoes in smaller pieces if you don't like it chunky. Good with a meal or as a snack with chips.

Local soliders injured in Iraqi mortar attack

Hostilities in Iraq hit close to home last month when two Grant men were wounded in an insurgent attack.

Daniel Martin, an employee of New Hope Telephone Cooperative, and Michael Austin were injured August 18 when a mortar round exploded approximately 25 feet in front of them. Martin and Austin had just emailed their wives and were headed for the separate shower building when the mortar round came over the gate at their base in Najaf.


Both men are members of the National Guard's 279th Signal Battalion, an Arab-based unit which was activated earlier this year to provide tactical communications in Iraq.

Martin's injuries were minor. He was hit by shrapnel in one ear and both legs, but was treated at the Baghdad Medical Facility and returned to duty. Austin reportedly suffered wounds to his diaphragm and chest areas, and his damaged spleen had to be removed. He also suffered partial yet permanent vision loss in one eye.

As of August 31, Austin's condition was improving. He was expected to be released and sent back to the

United States for additional treatment and recovery.

Please continue to remember these men and their families – as well as all service men and women – as the war in Iraq continues.
