# Cooperative ready to meet changes head on

ummer is here! Even though the heat makes us want to stay close to the air conditioning unit for most of the season, there are many activities that bring us outdoors including our children playing baseball and taking family vacations. We also celebrate Independence Day and give thanks for living in this great country. One of the things that makes our country the land of opportunity is our belief that by working hard — and working together — we can achieve anything.

And that is the cooperative spirit. I want to thank all of our members for coming to our annual meeting in May. It's important that everyone is informed about what NHTC has accomplished over the past year, and the annual meeting is always a great way to show off what your cooperative has been working on. This year we were able to show our continued, steady progress on our fiber construction

As people continue to rely on the Internet for their work, education, healthcare and more, NHTC is working to provide a new, stronger fiber optic infrastructure for our members. Fiber is the future, and during the annual meeting we discussed changes to our cooperative as the Universal Service Fund — which helped provide telephone service to rural areas — is being phased out. It is being replaced with the Connect America Fund, which will instead focus on funding broadband Internet initiatives. NHTC is getting ready for this change, thanks to the hard work and planning of our employ-

We also discussed the problem of rising retransmission rates and what that has meant for our cooperative. Networks such as NBC, ABC, FOX and CBS have begun charging much higher fees for allowing us to retransmit their signal to you. Previously, NHTC has been able to absorb all retransmission fees and hold the cost of cable down for our members. These new rates, however, stand to cost the cooperative hundreds of thousands of dollars. After more than ten years without a rate increase on cable, we were forced to raise rates to account for these costs. We are doing everything in our power to make sure that we can continue to provide a great selection for our customers at affordable rates.

NHTC's new Computer Repair Service was also highlighted at our meeting. We have had great reviews and much success since we began offering this service to our members. It is a quality service that not only helps our members, but generates additional rev-

enue for the cooperative as well.

It has been a great year for NHTC, even with the rapid changes affecting our cooperative and industry. I want to thank all of our members for

# Career Day at DAR and New Hope Schools

Both New Hope and DAR schools offered elementary and middle school students an opportunity to learn about many careers they may someday be interested in pursuing. New Hope Telephone Cooperative participated in the event at both schools.

# Cash those capital reminder credits checks

The Board of Directors for New Hope Telephone Cooperative has once again voted to return a portion of the company's equity back to its members.

Because NHTC is a cooperative, members earn capital credits based on the amount of business they do with the cooperative. A percentage of those credits are returned to all active members as the Board of Directors deems financially feasible.

This year's refund represents one-half percent of the total capital credits each member has accumulated to date, minus any refunds that have already been given. Checks were mailed to members in May and most have already been cashed.

Capital credit checks are only valid for 90 days.

Replacement checks are costly and time consuming for your cooperative. Therefore, NHTC will reissue checks for those lost or uncashed in May 2013 when capital credit checks are issued next year.

Please cash your capital credit checks today if you have not already done so.



# Enjoy local produce through a CSA









That began as a hobby for Owens Cross Roads resident Donna Watts has become more than a full-time job for her and her husband Ronnie. And the pair couldn't be happier.

In 2007, a debilitating eye condition known as ischemic optic neuropathy left Donna legally blind. "It affected one eye," says Donna, "and four months later, it started in the other eye. I was left with what is called central vision. I have no peripheral vision, and what I do see is blurry, fuzzy and not very good. It looks dark and I can't make out features. I can't see any fine details."

After 24 years as a nurse, Donna had to leave her job. Looking for something to do, she began a greenhouse garden as a hobby. But when Ronnie was laid off from his job with a propane gas company last year, the two came up with a plan to expand their garden.

The couple started R&D Farms, a CSA, or community-supported agriculture. The concept has been around for years. Pay a local farmer to help cover seed, equipment and labor costs; in exchange, you'll receive a weekly supply of fresh, healthy produce when the crops are ready for harvest.

R&D Farms is the first CSA in the local area. The next closest one is in Tennessee.

Donna says 25 families from Hampton Cove, Owens Cross Roads, New Hope and Gurley each bought a share in the harvest from R&D Farms. Throughout the spring and summer, members received a weekly delivery of fresh, local produce. Among the deliveries were romaine and butter crunch lettuce, tomatoes, corn, okra, peas, beans and more. The farm is growing

watermelons, cantaloupe and pumpkins which they hope will be ready to include in packages later this summer and into the fall.

"Most people have said they are getting more than they can eat in a week," says Donna. "But they are glad to have locally-grown fresh foods that are healthy and nutritious and haven't come from across the country or the world."

Ronnie says CSAs offer many advantages over produce purchased from some grocery stores. "It's fresher, for one thing," says Ronnie. "I deliver packages once a week, soon after everything is picked. It all ripened on the plant, not in a truck on its way across the country. Foods imported from other countries don't have the same safety standards as produce from the USA either

"And people are beginning to care more about where their food comes from, too," adds Ronnie. "There have been so many reports of people getting sick from the foods they eat and companies that didn't take all the safety precautions they should have."

Donna says they've learned a lot this year and are better prepared for the next growing season. "I've learned what people like and what they don't like," she says. "Next year we will have more Silver Queen and Peaches and Cream corn and less Golden Queen corn. And people don't like strings in their beans. Next year we're planting Blue Lake beans. They're a stringless variety."

"Whatever we plant," says Ronnie, "people can be assured that we're not using genetically modified seeds. We're planting and growing vegetables like their parents and grandparents always have."

# **Annual Meeting 2012**

# Wing updates members on federal changes coming to telco industry

esidents of New Hope, Grant and Owens Cross Roads attended the Annual Meeting of New Hope Telephone Cooperative on May 15. More than 200 members registered to cast their ballots in the election for board members, returning incumbents Barry Jones and Mike Whitaker, both of New Hope, to their positions on the cooperative's governing body.

Tom Wing, NHTC general manager, updated members about NHTC's involvement in an ambitious project with Northeast Alabama Electric Cooperative. NAEC received a \$19 million broadband development grant to deliver highspeed Internet to its members. "We will be their technical partner," said Wing of the venture.

"We've also just installed an 80KW generator in our headend," said Wing. NHTC's cable headend was not previously protected by a generator. This addition will protect cable subscribers from service interruptions in certain situations.

Members learned that the final phase of NHTC's fiber construction project in the Grant exchange would begin in late May and would finish at the end of the first quarter of 2013.

They also learned that many changes are on the horizon for the telecommunications industry. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has started releasing some information to businesses about what changes are coming. As expected, the Universal Service Fund, which helped rural areas recover some of the expense of connecting to the national telephone network, is being phased out over five years.

The Connect America Fund will take the place of the Universal Service Fund. This fund will focus on high-speed Internet connections rather than landline telephone service. Fortunately, NHTC has been offering broadband for some time. And with fiber-to-the-home connections being installed, your cooperative is on schedule to meet the new requirements which will be set by the Connect America Fund.

To help offset some of the revenue expected to be lost with the loss of the Universal Service Fund, your cooperative is taking measures to find new sources of revenue, Wing told the crowd. NHTC has already added computer repair to its list of services provided. "We are also currently evaluating security systems as an additional source of revenue," says Wing. A group from NHTC recently went to Ellijay, Ga. to evaluate a system in place at a cooperative there.

A seven-minute video that had been prepared to update members on the past year of operations was not played due to technical difficulties. Members can view the video online at nhtc.coop.

The main attraction of the evening was the door prizes.

Some 85 prizes were given away, including totes, umbrellas, phones, digital photo frames, cash and high-definition television sets.

After the conclusion of the Annual Meeting, board members returned to the cooperative for a meeting to elect new officers. Your new officers are: Greg Glover, president; David Ayers, vice president; Mike Whitaker, secretary; and Jimmy Segler, treasurer.



school. That story in particular really seemed to touch his friend.

"He asked me if I had ever considered having my stories published," recalls Donnie. "Since I had received a journal for Christmas a few years before, everything I've written I did with the intention of someday putting in a book. But I had never contacted a publisher." Donnie's friend told him that he would research some possibilities; the following month he had a list of publishers for Donnie's consideration.

One company — Tate Publishing — stood out from the others. "They were a Christian company," says Donnie. "I really liked what they stood for and I thought they would understand my writing and be more likely to publish than some other companies."

### Faith

Early one Saturday morning in August 2011, Donnie and his wife Kanita, an employee at NHTC, submitted his story to Tate Publishing for consideration. Only two days later Donnie received a phone call from Stacy Baker with Tate. "She asked me what my intentions for the story were," recalls Donnie. "I told her I thought it might be considered for something like 'Chicken Soup for the Soul.' Stacy asked

me if I had ever considered writing a children's story. She said when she read my story it made her think of her father and brought tears to her eyes."

Donnie had never considered a children's story but told Stacy he would give it a try.

Two weeks later, Donnie had still not started the children's story when he found himself on a bus trip to Dallas, Texas, with his father and brother. They were going to Cowboys Stadium on a mini-vacation. During the ride, Donnie was struck with inspiration for the children's story. "It was like the floodgates had opened," he recalls. "The story just came to me and I started writing on the only thing I had — my iPod touch."

His daughter Izzy was his inspiration for the children's story. "She was 4 years old at the time and very inquisitive," Donnie says. "I started thinking about how many questions she asks and how she interacts with other kids, and the story poured out of me."

Donnie submitted the children's version of his story on Sep. 18, 2011, and waited.

### Hope

"I knew I would instantly start having grand thoughts," he says. "But I also

knew Kanita would keep me grounded."
"He's a dreamer," jokes his wife. "But
I believed in him."

It only took a few days for Donnie to discover what the fate of his children's story would be. "Tate loved the story and decided to publish it," he says. The book, entitled "Spirit Eyes," is scheduled for release this August. It will be available at Amazon.com, Christian-Books.com, Barnes & Noble, through Tate Publishing and independent bookstores.

### A Father's love

The book tells the story of a young girl who wants to see God. She looks for Him everywhere and is finally able to see when she uses her "spirit eyes" on her walk home from school with her father.

"My hope," says Donnie, "is that parents will read this with their children or Sunday school teachers will read it to their class and that it will start a conversation. I've tried to write the ending to encourage that. I want kids to use this as a stepping stone to having faith in God. I didn't start out with intentions of writing a children's story, but if that's what draws people in I'm all for it."



It was a warm, sunny afternoon last spring when an NHTC Internet customer received a phone call from a man who said he was a representative of Microsoft Corporation. The caller informed her that a virus had attacked thousands of computers and that her computer may have been infected. Most likely, he explained, it had been sent to her through an email or a link she had clicked while searching online.

The very knowledgeable representative explained that a patch had been created for the virus and they needed her permission to access her computer remotely to install the patch and remove the virus. She followed the instructions given to her and watched as the representative took control of her computer. It only took a few minutes for the helpful associate to install the patch, remove the virus and have the customer's computer performing like new again.

Only a few days later, this customer began having doubts about whether it was truly a representative from Microsoft that contacted her. She began to question the wisdom of allowing a stranger access to her computer. Could it have been a computer hacker? Could she have unwittingly given them access to all of her private information? Not knowing for sure what to do, she contacted her Internet service provider, New Hope Telephone Cooperative.

"I asked her to bring the computer in so we could run a diagnostic program and identify whether or not her computer had been compromised," says Rusty Bright, NHTC's network manager.

A thorough scan revealed that the computer was free from all known viruses. "However, there was spyware imbedded in the computer that provided a back door," says Bright. "Hackers were keeping other viruses from attacking her computer — but at the same time, they had created a way to gain access to this member's computer any time. They could have stolen credit card numbers, bank account information or any other private information stored or accessed on it."

This example sheds light on a growing trend known as social engineering. It is sometimes called a confidence trick or fraud, but social engineering is manipulating or tricking someone into divulging information or giving access to information that will enable the con to steal from the victim. In most cases the con never comes face-to-face with the victim.

And while most of us think it could never happen to us, that we could never be conned, it happens every day. "The people who perpetrate these sorts of things are professionals," says Bright. "This is how they make money, and they are very good at what they do. People have a tendency to want to be helpful and trusting. Social engineers believe it is easier to exploit human nature rather than exploit weaknesses in computer programs."

One common social engineering plot involves leaving thumb drives with a company's logo in cafeterias or restrooms of that business. The con is counting on an unsuspecting employee to insert the thumb drive — which has been embedded with a malicious code — into his or her USB drive in an effort to determine who the owner is and return it. This surprisingly simple ploy has been used to effectively hack many large corporations.

While the threat is very real, there are several things you can do to protect yourself from social engineers while enjoying your online activity.

### 1) BE SKEPTICAL.

If someone calls you claiming to be from Microsoft, NHTC or any other company that you have not contacted, don't trust them. Most companies will not contact you by phone unsolicited. Hang up the phone, look up the phone number for the company and call them back. If you receive an email that appears to be from a trusted company, such as your bank, don't trust it. Call the company to verify whether or not the email is legitimate. And don't call the number listed on the email either. Look up the number to your local office or branch.

# 2) INSTALL ANTIVIRUS SOFTWARE AND KEEP IT UP TO DATE.

Viruses and worms can attack your computer without your knowledge. Antivirus programs run in the background and protect your computer by searching for and removing or disarming any malicious programs found. New viruses are created every day, so it is imperative that you keep your antivirus program updated for the best protection.

### 3) MAKE SURE YOUR FIREWALL IS ON.


A firewall is software or hardware that checks information coming from the Internet or a network, and either blocks it or allows it to pass through to your computer, depending on your firewall settings. To make sure the firewall has not been disabled on your Microsoft Windows Operating System, follow these steps:

 Open Windows Firewall by clicking the Start button, clicking Control Panel, clicking Security, and then clicking Windows Firewall.

- Click Turn Windows Firewall on or off. If prompted, provide an administrator password or confirmation.
- Click On, and then click OK.

# 4) IF YOU HAVE A WIRELESS ROUTER, PROTECT IT WITH A PASSWORD.

Someone could gain access to an unprotected router by simply driving down the road with a laptop searching for a wireless Internet connection. If someone uses your Internet connection for illegal activity, such as downloading illegal movies and music or sending spam emails, you could be held responsible.



# 5) KEEP YOUR OPERATING SYSTEM UP-TO-DATE.

Computer operating systems are periodically updated to fix security holes. Be sure to install the updates to ensure your computer has the latest protection.

# 6) BEWARE OF EMAIL FROM UNKNOWN SOURCES AND SUSPICIOUS EMAIL ATTACHMENTS.

According to Microsoft, a firewall can't determine the contents of email so it can't protect you from these types of viruses. You should use an antivirus program to scan and delete suspicious attachments from an email before you open it. Even when you have an antivirus program, you should not open an email attachment if you're not positive that it's safe.

# Don't text and drive

## Police begin ticketing on Aug. 1

Gov. Robert Bentley signed a law into effect on May 8 that makes text messaging while driving illegal on any Alabama road effective Aug. 1. Alabama joins 37 other states that have already banned texting while driving.

The bill prohibits sending text messages, instant messages and emails while behind the wheel, but does not ban dialing the phone. Drivers will face a \$25 fine for their first violation and a \$50 fine thereafter.

According to statistics from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, texting while driving your vehicle makes you 23 times more likely to have an accident and has been compared to driving while intoxicated. In a Harris Interactive Poll conducted for State Farm Insurance in February, 57 percent of teen drivers in the U.S. admit to having texted while driving.

"It doesn't take a lot of common sense to know that you can't text and drive at the same time," said Gov. Bentley before signing the bill into law outside the Alabama Capitol.
